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Foreword

I am delighted to be asked to commend this book to you. Even after nearly 29 years as a Prison Chaplain, I can still be surprised by prisoners' comments, and one made a few weeks ago from a young prisoner has stayed with me. 'Can't we have the proper Lord's Prayer?' he asked. Despite being only 27 years old, he was put out that we were using the modern rendering of the prayer in our Holy Communion Service. Somewhere along his life journey, he had encountered the older version; perhaps at school or at his grandparents' church and had a spiritual and emotional connection with it.

Although, in my own prison, we use mostly contemporary worship songs, sometimes there are occasions when the more traditional hymns will be the ones with tunes that are vaguely familiar to the congregation. I often find myself, after singing one of the hymns in this book, trying to explain why the words are wonderful and insightful and have eternal truths for us to take in.

I remember a service which included the hymn *Amazing Grace*. I took time to talk about 'grace' and what it means. 'Oh,' said one of the men sitting in front of me who was always happy to contribute whether invited to or not, 'I always thought grace referred to a woman!' I was delighted to be able to put him right and very entertained by the idea of Grace being a favourite friend of John Newton! That man went on to explore the gospel truths embedded in that wonderful hymn and, since his release, he has gone from strength to strength as a disciple of Jesus.

The careful choice of hymns, alongside the selected scriptures, has resulted in a book that is full of Biblical truth. Those who are

walking with Jesus will draw comfort, strength and encouragement from it – and will also be challenged. At the same time, it may well prove a way into faith for others as it triggers memories or deepens understanding. My prayer is that it will.

INTRODUCTION

It is easy to take for granted the abundance of hymns that God has inspired to be written over the centuries, many of which remain popular today, alongside modern worship songs. But it is easy to enjoy singing them without fully grasping their truths from God's Word.

Hymns lead us to thank, praise and worship God; to reflect upon Christ's sacrifice of His life; to recognise and confess our sins; to encourage us when we are weary; to challenge us towards a closer walk with Christ; to spur us on through trials; and to remind us of the glorious day of His return.

This collection of hymns, with appropriate scriptures and very short reflections, has been compiled for men and women in prison who are following Jesus and His teachings. Its aim is simple – to encourage them and help them to draw strength from God's Word while serving their sentence.

But we do hope that those who have yet to make a decision to follow Jesus will also find the book helpful. If you are in that situation, or if you are unclear what that really means, we recommend that you read the following pages, What Is A Christian?, before you go any further. It is crucial to understand what the Bible actually teaches, rather than go along with any of the commonly held ideas.

You will gain most from the book if you go through it slowly; perhaps focusing on just one or two devotionals each day. Ask God to show you if there is something specifically He wants you to note, either from the scripture or from the hymn. There are blank pages at the back of the book for any notes you want to make. You may then wish to give thanks to God, confess a sin or ask for His help if something is troubling you.

As you work through the book, you will find suggestions for prayer for your prison. Please use them. You can make a difference by praying regularly. If possible, meet with others to pray.

It is our prayer that God will be pleased to use *Inner Hope* to bring hope to all who dip into it and bring glory to Himself.

We must first acknowledge the 50 writers of the hymns selected for this book. Undoubtedly, it was only by God's inspiration that their hymns would be sung for several generations. Many were written in the 18th century. We thank God for inspiring the writers to present His truths to be sung for His glory. We have included very short biographies of nine of the hymn writers.

WHAT IS A CHRISTIAN?

Missing the point

Many people completely miss the point about what it means to be a Christian. Some think that you are a Christian if you are born into a Christian family or even in a 'Christian country'.

Others realise that being a Christian is more than a label: it's about the beliefs you hold about God and the way you live, such as loving your neighbour and doing your best to obey the Ten Commandments. And others believe that attending church is necessary.

But all those ideas miss the point.

The Bible is clear

The Bible is clear: it is about a personal relationship with God that matters. And that relationship only comes through being a follower (or disciple) of Jesus Christ. The Bible teaches that:

- God created the whole world. And He created us in His likeness, to be in relationship with Him.
- we are all sinful. That is our nature. We inherited it from Adam when he sinned in the Garden of Eden. We all break God's laws, by the way we behave and even by our thoughts.
- God Himself is absolutely holy and pure and cannot tolerate sin. And because He is holy, He is also just. That means He cannot simply ignore our sin; it has to be punished.

The Bible tells us:

... for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God ... Romans 3:23 And so there is a dilemma. How can we enjoy a relationship with God, when He is pure and holy and cannot tolerate our sin? Impossible!

The impossible made possible

The Bible explains how the impossible has been made possible:

- the only way was for someone else to take the punishment we deserve – but it had to be someone who had never sinned themselves.
- there was only one person able to do that: God's only Son, Jesus Christ.
- Jesus came into the world and willingly sacrificed His life to take the punishment for our sin. He did that when He endured the most brutal and horrific death by crucifixion.

On the third day, Jesus was raised from the dead. Forty days later, He returned to be with His Father in heaven.

The Bible tells us:

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

John 3:16

And Jesus Himself said:

I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

John 14:6

This leaves us with a choice to make. We can accept Jesus' offer to take our punishment. God will then forgive us, treating us as though we have never sinned, accepting us as His children and welcoming us into heaven to be with Him forever.

The Bible tells us:

God made him (Jesus) who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

2 Corinthians 5:21

Sadly, most choose to reject Jesus' offer. They reject Jesus Himself.

Jesus gave this warning – of the broad road that leads to destruction: Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it.

Matthew 7:13

We do not know when Jesus will return from heaven to judge us all. There will be no warning. Those who have chosen the broad road of life will be declared guilty. There will be no second chance.

Which road are you on?

Have you acknowledged your sin before God, repented of it and received His forgiveness, through trusting that Jesus died in your place? If not, then you are on that broad road.

Whatever mess you may have made of your life, you can get on to the narrow road that leads to heaven by:

- admitting that you are a sinner,
- accepting that Jesus died on the cross in your place and for your sins,
- repenting of your sins, that is, choosing not to continue to live as you have,
- asking God to forgive you, choosing to follow Jesus and live according to His teaching.

If you are ready to make that decision, you can do that now by saying this prayer.

Dear Father God,

I am really sorry for everything in my life, past and present, that is not right. I want to stop living that way. I want to get right with you.

Thank You for sending Jesus to die in my place, in order to save me from the punishment I deserve. I want to live to please Jesus and to make Him the centre of my life – to be my King.

So please forgive me and accept me as Your child.

Please fill me with Your Holy Spirit to help me live this new life with Jesus.

Amen

If you have prayed this prayer and been sincere, God welcomes you into His family as His child. Do not worry if you do not feel any different. It is important to rely on God's promises in the Bible rather than on your feelings.

Tell a chaplain or a Christian friend of your decision and ask them to help you to start reading the Bible. It is also important to meet with other followers of Jesus. They will help you as you begin your new life.

You are also welcome to contact us, whether you have prayed that prayer or whether you have questions you would like to ask. We will be pleased to help you in any way we can.

Solid Rock

Jesus answered (Thomas), 'I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.'

Question: 'Will I go to heaven?' Answer: 'It all depends!'

What it *doesn't* depend on is our past lives; our achievements; our good works or the opinions of others. The only issue is whether we are trusting Jesus.

No one else and nothing else will be of any value when Jesus returns from heaven to judge everyone. He is our one and only hope of heaven.

And it is not an uncertain hope. It is backed by God's Word, which assures us that '... Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name ... by which we must be saved..'¹

Take a moment to thank God that nothing you have done will count against you; you will be welcomed into heaven because you have repented and your hope is firmly resting on Jesus.

This hymn reminds us that God's Word is the solid foundation for living for believers. And these words from Isaiah, referred to in the hymn, remind us of the depth of His love for us.

Think through the truths. Firstly, we learn that God has summoned us by name; our relationship with Him is deeply personal. Secondly, we are promised that God will be with us whatever we face; He will not allow anything to overwhelm us.

Let us never neglect God's Word, which reveals His character and His love for us, reassuring us of His constant care for all His children.

How crucial to your spiritual diet in prison is 'God's excellent Word'?

How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in His excellent word! What more can He say than to you He hath said – To you who for refuge to Jesus have fled?

Fear not, I am with thee, O, be not dismayed, For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid; I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand, Upheld by My gracious, omnipotent hand.

When through the deep waters I call thee to go, The rivers of sorrow shall not overflow; For I will be with thee thy trouble to bless, And sanctify to thee thy deepest distress.

When through fiery trials thy pathway shall lie, My grace, all-sufficient, shall be thy supply; The flame shall not harm thee; I only design Thy dross to consume and thy gold to refine.

THE TEST, THE JOY, THE CROWN

Blessed is the one who perseveres under trial because, having stood the test, that person will receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised to those who love him.

James 1:12

In chapter 1 verse 2, the apostle James encourages believers to consider it 'pure joy' whenever they face trials. It's a warning that there will be tough times, including battles against temptation and all that the powers of this dark world will throw at us.

But, in verse 12, there is a promise: the crown of life to Jesus' followers who persevere through their trials.

The trials are temporary, but the 'crown' will be a personal welcome by Jesus into an eternal home with Him. We cannot imagine the joy – an abundant joy – of being welcomed 'home' by Jesus.

If you are facing a trial, is there another Christian who will pray with you? Or perhaps there is a Christian who is struggling and would appreciate you praying for them. Fight the good fight with all thy might; Christ is thy strength, and Christ thy right. Lay hold on life, and it shall be Thy joy and crown eternally.

Run the straight race through God's good grace, Lift up thine eyes, and seek His face; Life with its path before us lies; Christ is the way, and Christ the prize.

Do you have that same confidence as Paul? If not, be honest with God about your doubts.

We hope that you will be encouraged to pray regularly if you are not already doing so, and that you will find the suggested prayers and topics helpful. But they are only suggestions and some will need to be adapted. And there will almost certainly be other needs particular to your own prison.

And you may not have to pray alone. Could you meet with another Christian – or two or three – to pray together for your own personal needs as well as for the prison?

As you pray, expect God to answer your prayers – and always give thanks as He does. And especially, never cease to thank Him for Jesus, the Saviour of all who trust Him and follow Him.

Heavenly Father,

Thank you for those for whom this prison is their place of work. I pray that they will not view their work as just a job to earn a living; rather an opportunity to support people who are hurting and need care, alongside the punishment of imprisonment. Please protect all who work in this prison, both from physical injury and exhaustion and from mental and emotional stress.

In Jesus' Name.

Amen

Almighty God,

I pray for everyone in this prison – residents and those who work here – who do not know You and do not know anything of Your love.

Please reveal Yourself to them by revealing to them Your Son, Jesus, who surrendered His life to save us from the punishment we all deserve.

God longs to show mercy and to pardon all who confess their sins and repent. As the song says, 'Our sins they are many, His mercy is more.'¹

This hymn reminds us of Jesus speaking of the owner of a hundred sheep searching for one who had wandered off.² It is a picture of God's loving and tender care and concern for every one of His children.

Is Jesus calling you back to Himself? Or is there someone you know who has wandered away from the Saviour whom you can encourage to turn back?

Can you think of a time when Jesus may have been pleading for you?

THE DEBT: CANCELLED

... Christ came as the high priest ... He did not enter by means of the blood of goats or calves; but he entered the Most Holy Place once for all by his own blood.

John Newton, who wrote this hymn, had lived a harsh ungodly life as a slave trader until he gave his heart and life to Jesus. Then everything changed.

Writing this hymn, he pictured himself standing at the cross and looking up at Jesus as Jesus looks down at him. In that moment he knows that it is his sin that has caused Jesus' death.

The second look from Jesus is a look of forgiveness. And seeing that look of love he understands, 'Jesus is dying to pay my ransom'. There is life for the sinner only in the death of the Saviour.

Imagine it is you standing at the foot of the cross. What do you understand?

I saw One hanging on a tree, In agony and blood, Who fixed His languid eyes on me, As near His cross I stood.

Oh, can it be, upon a tree, The Saviour died for me? My soul is thrilled, my heart is filled, To think He died for me!

Sure, never to my latest breath, Can I forget that look; It seemed to charge me with His death, Though not a word He spoke.

My conscience felt and owned the guilt, And plunged me in despair, I saw my sins His blood had spilt, And helped to nail Him there.

As WE FORGIVE

And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. Matthew 6:12

God expects us to regularly ask Him to forgive us; it is a key part of the Lord's Prayer. But there is a condition attached to His forgiveness – we must have forgiven those who have hurt us.

Jesus emphasised this with a warning '... if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins.'¹

As the writer of this hymn has noted, the debts owed to us are trivial in comparison with the debt owed to our Saviour.

And the apostle Paul wrote, 'Get rid of all bitterness \ldots for giving each other...'^2

Are there people whom you have been unwilling or unable to forgive? Reflect again on the price paid to clear your debt, and ask God to help you to forgive.

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HYMN WRITERS

Biographies can be very interesting and especially the biographies of writers. It is useful to know something of their background.

It is especially helpful to know their motivation for the writing of the book, the poem or song – what inspired it. That insight will often help us to enjoy it more.

That is certainly true of the hymns we sing. Many would have even greater meaning if we knew of the writer's circumstances at the time of writing and what prompted or inspired the hymn.

Sadly, for the vast majority, we know very little of the background, if anything. However, there are some 'stories behind the hymns' that have been recorded for us. We think that you will enjoy the few that we have selected.

FRANCES RIDLEY HAVERGAL, 1836-1879

Born in Astley, Worcestershire

Frances was the youngest child of a Church of England minister. Despite frail health, she led an active life, in demand as a concert soloist. She was also a brilliant pianist and learned several modern languages as well as Greek and Hebrew.

But it is her faith for which she is remembered – and her poetry and hymns. Frances had begun reading and memorising the Bible at the age of four and wrote her first poems when seven. She never wrote a line of poetry without praying over it.

Her passion was to encourage people to turn to Jesus and to encourage believers to seek a deeper spiritual walk.

Take My Life and Let It Be was inspired during a short break with other women. Frances wrote,

There were ten persons in the house; some were unconverted and ... some converted but not rejoicing Christians. [God] gave me the prayer, 'Lord, give me all in this house.' And He just did. Before I left the house, everyone had got a blessing.

On the last night, with much rejoicing and without the need to sleep, the words of the hymn came to Frances, finishing with '... ever only, all for Thee!' That was on 4 February 1874 when she was 37. She died five years later.

PHILIP BLISS, 1838-1876

Born in Pennsylvania, USA

Philip's family was poor but it was a happy home. He was taught to pray, read the Bible and sing. It is said of him that 'he was born with a melody in his heart.'

With no money available for his education, he started working alongside men at a lumber camp when he was only eleven. He made his first public confession of faith in Christ when he was twelve.

In 1859 he married Lucy and began working with her father on his farm. Lucy's grandmother recognised his musical talent and paid for him to have music lessons. He became a music teacher with a great tenor voice, writing many hymns which are still sung today.

Philip then worked with an evangelist at gospel meetings, singing hymns including some he had written himself.

On 29th December 1876, Philip and Lucy were travelling by train to a gospel meeting in Chicago. As the train was crossing a bridge spanning a river, the bridge collapsed and the carriages plummeted into the chasm below. A fire ensued and there were few survivors. The bodies of Philip and Lucy were never recovered.

Philip's premature death was a great tragedy – and Lucy's too. But Philip left a wonderful legacy of hymns behind for us.

Fanny Crosby, 1820-1915

Born in New York

When she was six weeks old, Fanny became blind. Her father then died when she was just six months old. Her mother and grandmother brought her up and taught her to learn passages from the Bible by heart. From the age of ten, she learnt five chapters a week until she could quote whole books from the Bible.

She married in 1858 and wrote *Safe in the arms of Jesus* when their new-born baby died. Her hymn writing really began in earnest a few years later, in 1864.

Fanny had a great compassion for the poor, choosing to live in a dismal flat in Manhattan so that she could be generous to the broken and the homeless.

She also took great delight in sharing the gospel and often spoke and sang in prisons and at gospel missions.

She would say that her blindness was a gift from God because '... the first face I will ever see will be His!'

Fanny died at the age of 94, leaving Christians with a treasury of wonderful hymns in praise of the Saviour. It is uncertain how many she wrote for she used many pseudonyms to preserve her modesty; the number is thought to be at least 8,000.

George Matheson, 1842-1906

Born in Glasgow

Despite his failing eyesight, George studied at university to be a preacher and graduated with honours at 19. A year later he was completely blind.

Having got engaged, he was devastated when his fiancée returned the ring, having decided that she couldn't face life with a blind husband.

George put all his energy into his ministry and became a very prominent preacher across Scotland. In 1885, he accepted an invitation to preach to Queen Victoria at Balmoral.

George only wrote a few hymns. The most well-known (see below) was written on the evening of his sister's wedding. This sister had supported him since he lost his sight. He was no doubt very saddened by the loss of her support and by the memory of his broken engagement 20 years earlier.

George later recounted his experience that evening:

... Something happened to me, which was known only to myself, and which caused me the most severe mental suffering. The hymn was the fruit of that suffering. It was the quickest bit of work I ever did in my life. I had the impression of having it dictated to me by some inward voice rather than of working it out myself. I am quite sure that the whole work was completed in five minutes...

JAMES MONTGOMERY, 1771-1854

Born in Irvine, Scotland

James became an orphan while at boarding school. His parents died in the West Indies where they were serving as missionaries.

On leaving school, he worked for a Sheffield newspaper where he later became editor. He was passionately against the wrongs in society and used the newspaper to speak out.

When the infamous Bastille prison was destroyed by French rioters, he openly approved of its destruction and was arrested and imprisoned. Years later he was again sent to prison for his public criticism of a magistrate.

James gave considerable time to fighting for the rights of the oppressed, campaigning against both slavery and against the use of boys as apprentices to chimney sweeps. The boys lived in squalor and many were seriously injured or killed while working in the chimneys. Eventually, both practices were abolished.

He left the newspaper but remained a prolific writer of poems and hymns. He wrote about 400 hymns, including the Christmas carol, *Angels from the realms of glory*.

Like Jesus, James Montgomery was a champion of the poor. And he was a righteous, outspoken man of God.

Prayer is the soul's sincere desire, Unuttered or expressed; Page 105

John Newton, 1725-1807

Born in Wapping, London

John was only six when his mother died. She had taught him the truth of the Bible and the power of prayer. But he wandered from the faith when he was eleven and began to work alongside his father, a ship's captain.

Seven years later he was forced to join the Royal Navy. Because he tried to desert, he was punished by being sent to engage in the slave trade; his ship transported boys and men from African countries into slavery across the world.

John eventually became captain of his own slave trading ship. One night a fierce storm put the ship in grave danger. Recalling what his mother had taught him about the power of prayer, he called out to God, pleading with Him that the ship, and all the crew, might be saved.

His prayer was answered. He responded by committing his life to Christ, recognising God's 'amazing grace'. He was ordained as a church minister and wrote hymns, most famously, *Amazing Grace*, inspired by his own conversion.

Recognising the evil of slavery in which he had been involved, John supported William Wilberforce in campaigning for its abolition. He died just a few months after Parliament passed the Abolition of Slavery law.

HORATIO SPAFFORD, 1828-1888

Born in New York

Horatio, a wealthy American lawyer, lived in Chicago with his wife, Anna, and their four daughters.

When the Great Chicago Fire destroyed the city in 1871, Horatio lost most of his investments, including properties in which he had invested just months earlier.

Despite their losses, as Christians they felt it was right to use the money they had to support the many thousands of other victims.

In 1873, they decided to travel to Europe. At the last minute, Horatio was detained on business and so Anna and their daughters embarked on the journey without him. Tragically the ship never arrived. It collided with a sailing vessel and quickly sank.

Anna survived but their daughters were amongst the 220 people who died. On his way to join his distraught wife, now in Wales, Horatio passed the spot where the disaster had occurred. At that point, he wrote the hymn, *It is well with my soul*.

Instead of blaming God for his loss, Horatio clung to Him in his grief. And whenever life hurts, the arms of God are our only safe place. Even through our tears, we too can sing, 'It is well with my soul'.

Inner Hope

JOSEPH SCRIVEN, 1819-1896

Born in County Down, Ireland

After graduating from Trinity College, Dublin, Joseph enrolled in a military college. However, poor health forced him to give up his ambition of an army career. Then he was struck by the tragic loss of his fiancée on the night before their wedding. He watched in horror as her body was dragged from a river.

A few months later, now 25, he emigrated to Canada, where he sought to live according to Jesus' teaching, giving and sharing all he had and often doing menial tasks for the poor and physically disabled. He became known as 'the Good Samaritan of Port Hope'.

In 1855, he wrote a poem to comfort his mother in Ireland, on hearing that she was very unwell.

In 1860, Joseph got engaged but suffered another tragedy. Again there was no wedding; his fiancée died after contracting tuberculosis.

When he was very ill himself, a friend visited and spotted a copy of the poem that Joseph had sent to his mother. When asked who had written it, Joseph answered, 'the Lord and I did it between us.' That poem is now one of the most loved of all hymns, *What a friend we have in Jesus.*

Shortly after that, delirious with a fever one night, Joseph staggered outside the house. The following day he was found drowned in a creek.

CHARLES WESLEY, 1707-1788

Born in Epworth, Lincolnshire

Charles was one of 19 children, nine of whom died in infancy, born to Samuel Wesley, the Rector of Epworth, and Susannah. When 19, he went to study at Christ Church, University of Oxford, where he got'lost in diversions' from his studies.

He recorded that, in his third year, with two or three other students, '... I went to the weekly sacrament ... and observed the method of study prescribed by the statutes of the University'. He became known as 'the Methodist'; Methodism traces its origins to Charles and his older brother, John.

The two brothers visited debtors in the filthy Oxford prisons before going to Georgia, USA to support men who had been transported there. But Charles struggled and returned home, a broken man, bad tempered and addicted to drink.

Charles attributed his conversion to one Sunday in 1738 when he suddenly found himself 'at peace with God'. He began writing hymns again and preaching. He soon started to travel the country on horseback, drawing crowds of up to a thousand or more.

His concern for prisoners remained, often praying through the night with men in Newgate Prison in London, before their execution.

Charles Wesley had a remarkable ministry as an evangelist and as the writer of more than 6,000 hymns.

The writer of this hymn was once a prosperous family man. Then, through no fault of his own, he lost everything. Yet, he could still say, 'It is well with my soul'.

The souls of those who turn away from Jesus in life will face eternal judgement. But those who believe and follow Jesus find peace, knowing that all is well with their soul. Nothing in life is more important.

Do you have that same confidence that Horatio Spafford had – that all is well with your soul?

HOLINESS TAKES TIME

The apostle Paul expressed the same truth: 'So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him ...'¹

When you can, take a few minutes to read John 15:1-12 – slowly. It is a great passage.

It is thought that David wrote this psalm during his reign as king. But it wasn't on account of his wealth and power that he was able to say that there was nothing he needed. It was because the LORD was His shepherd; he knew that he needed nothing more.

In prison, it will be easy to grieve over everything that you are lacking. Ask the Lord to remind you that He is your shepherd. He is able to meet your deepest needs. The King of love my Shepherd is, Whose goodness faileth never; I nothing lack if I am His And He is mine forever.

Likewise, this hymn was John Newton's response to being saved by God's grace.

How foolish that anyone should think that they can ever earn God's acceptance by their good works.

If someone told you that God would never accept them on account of their crimes, how would you try to explain that is not true?

Similarly, Paul reminded the believers in Philippi that their citizenship is in heaven and they should be looking forward to the return of their Saviour.²

What a glorious day that will be when Jesus returns to receive everyone who has truly claimed 'this Jesus is mine' – those who have died and those still living! We should not assume that we will not be alive when He comes; that glorious day could come any day – even soon.

Read what Jesus Himself said about His return: Matthew chapters 24 and 25.

That cross ought to have been used for a criminal such as Barabbas, but it was the sinless Jesus who was crucified there. Barabbas walked free.

UNDER HIS WINGS

Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty. He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; Psalm 91:1,4a

In these verses, we see two metaphors that help us to understand God's care and protection. First, there is the shadow. When the heat of the sun becomes unbearable, we seek the shade where we can rest. When life itself becomes intense, we will find rest in the shadow of the Almighty.

Secondly, there is the wonderful picture of a bird covering its young under its outstretched wings, fearing possible predators. The bird protects those who are its own. And so it is with God. His care is for those who dwell in His shelter – those who permanently reside with Him.

There is much more in Psalm 91 that illustrates God's care and protection of those who belong to Him. Why not take time to read it and reflect upon it?

Under His wings I am safely abiding; Though the night deepens and tempests are wild, Still I can trust Him – I know He will keep me, He has redeemed me and I am His child.

MERCY FOR ALL

... Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners – of whom I am the worst ... I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life. 1 Timothy 1:15-16

The apostle Paul claimed for himself the title, 'the worst of sinners'. But he could not possibly have realised how his words would encourage so many, grieving over their sins and their crimes, to repent and seek God's mercy.

God Himself gave those words to Paul. He wanted to make known His love, compassion and mercy for us all, and especially for those most undeserving of it.

Perhaps Paul's words were a challenge to John Newton, who called himself a wretch in his wonderful hymn, *Amazing Grace*.¹ And the Lord has used that hymn to draw many to the Saviour.

Do you know of any in your prison who desperately need to hear Paul's words? Might God be asking you to share His 'depth of mercy' with someone?



Depth of mercy! Can there be Mercy still reserved for me? Can my God His wrath forbear? Me, the chief of sinners, spare?

I have long withstood His grace: Long provoked Him to His face; Would not hearken to His calls; Grieved Him by a thousand falls.

I my Master have denied, I afresh have crucified, Oft profaned His hallowed name, Put Him to an open shame.

There for me the Saviour stands, Shows His wounds and spreads His hands: God is love! I know, I feel; Jesus weeps, but loves me still!

WEAK, WORN, BROKEN

Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light. Matthew 11:28-30

These words of Jesus demonstrate His special compassion for the weak and weary and broken.

Jesus' attitude was in sharp contrast to that of the religious leaders. They laid down many trivial rules that had to be kept by wouldbe followers. They demanded observance of rules in order to earn acceptance. But Jesus promised rest and gentle instruction.

His way of training was like the practice of a younger animal being yoked to the plough, alongside a stronger and more experienced ox who leads gently. Jesus has not changed. When we are yoked with Him, He leads us at an appropriately gentle pace.

If you are feeling weary and overwhelmed, is it time to turn to Jesus to rest?

I heard the voice of Jesus say, 'Come unto me and rest; Lay down, O weary one, lay down Your head upon My breast': I came to Jesus as I was, Weary, and worn, and sad; I found in Him a resting-place, And He has made me glad.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, 'Behold, I freely give The living water, thirsty one, Stoop down and drink, and live': I came to Jesus, and I drank Of that life-giving stream; My thirst was quenched, my soul revived, And now I live in Him.

I heard the voice of Jesus say, 'I am this dark world's light; Look unto Me, your morn shall rise, And all your days be bright': I looked to Jesus and I found In Him my star, my sun; And in that light of life I'll walk Till travelling days are done.

THE NEEDY WELCOMED

... It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but those who are ill. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners.

Mark 2:17

Jesus spoke these words to the Pharisees when they complained that He was having a meal with 'sinners'. They could not understand Him wanting to spend time with people like tax collectors.

Jesus told a parable to explain that God will humble the self-righteous (such as the Pharisees) and exalt those who humble themselves before Him.¹

The writer of this hymn, Joseph Hart, rebelled against God for many years. He was 45 when he heard words of hope in a chapel and sought God's mercy. After becoming a minister, he wrote hymns like this to encourage 'sinners' to turn to Jesus.

Will you pray for those in your prison who do not realise that Jesus stands ready to save them?

Our short book, *Can I Forgive Myself*, has been written especially for the many men and women in prison who say they cannot 'forgive themselves' and cannot accept that God will forgive them. See details at the back of the book.

NEVER APART

For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

It seems strange that *Abide With Me* should be adopted by the Football Association and the Rugby League; it has been sung at their cup finals for decades.

Although suffering from a serious illness when he wrote the hymn, Henry Lyte knew he had nothing to fear. He reflected on the truth of the apostle Paul's words – that nothing, not even death, can separate believers from God's love.

Whilst prison walls isolate people from their families and friends and communities, they have no effect upon the Christian's relationship with God. On the contrary, they can bring a greater awareness of His presence and of His love.

In times of darkness – or at any time – pray Henry Lyte's prayer, Abide With Me. Then, read Paul's words (from Romans 8 above) with the same conviction that he had when he wrote them. Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide; When other helpers fail, and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day; Earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away; Change and decay in all around I see:

O Thou who changest not, abide with me.

I need Thy presence every passing hour; What but Thy grace can foil the tempter's power? Who like Thyself my guide and strength can be? Through cloud and sunshine, O abide with me.

I fear no foe with Thee at hand to bless; Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness. Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory? I triumph still, if Thou abide with me.

Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes, Shine through the gloom and point me to the skies; Heaven's morning breaks, and earth's vain shadows flee: In life, in death, O Lord, abide with me!

BE STILL

Are you growing in your knowledge of Christ; in your appreciation of His love for you and in your expression of your love for Him?

More about Jesus would I know, More of His grace to others show; More of His saving fullness see, More of His love who died for me.

More, more about Jesus, More, more about Jesus; More of His saving fullness see, More of His love who died for me.

More about Jesus let me learn, More of His holy will discern; Spirit of God, my teacher be, Showing the things of Christ to me.

More about Jesus in His Word, Holding communion with my Lord; Hearing His voice in ev'ry line, Making each faithful saying mine.

GLOSSARY

A short glossary of Biblical words

Atonement

A sacrifice that brings enemies together again. Jesus made atonement for our sins by His sacrifice, enabling us to be brought back to God.

Cherub (plural - Cherubim)

An angelic being who serves and worships God. They are first mentioned in Genesis 3:24 as guardians of the way back into the Garden of Eden after Adam was banished.

Grace

Grace means 'favour'. In the Bible it refers to kindness which is undeserved. We can only be saved by God's grace, not by any works. (Ephesians 2: 8-9)

Hades

Hades is the place where the spirits of unbelievers go when they die. They remain there until the final judgement when Jesus returns. At the end of time, Hades and death are both destroyed in a lake of fire. (Revelation 20:14)

High Priest

The high priest represented the Israelites before God and made sacrifices on their behalf. Jesus, having sacrificed Himself, is our 'great high priest'. It is through Him that we can now approach almighty God. (Hebrews 4:14)

Mercy

Mercy refers to taking pity and holding back punishment that is rightfully deserved.

Messiah

The Messiah is the 'Anointed One' which means the coming King – that is the Christ. (John 1:41)

Omnipotent

Omnipotent means unlimited power. Only God is omnipotent.

Pentecost

The New Testament marks the day of Pentecost as the occasion when the Holy Spirit came and filled the twelve disciples, as Jesus had promised. (Acts 2)

Redeemer

In Bible times, a redeemer was someone who paid for a slave to be set free. Jesus is our redeemer, having died to set us free from the slavery of sin.

Repentance

To repent is to change our thinking and our direction. It involves confessing our guilt and receiving God's forgiveness and then turning from our past life to begin a new life with Jesus.

Salvation

Salvation is being safe from God's wrath and judgement. See 'Grace' which is the means by which we are saved.

Seraphim

A group of heavenly beings. They are mentioned only in Isaiah 6:2-7, where they are continually worshipping the Lord.

Transgression

To transgress is to break a law or to sin. In the Bible, transgression is used to refer to an act of rebellion against God's authority over us.
